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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors
Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills
Carson, California

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities for Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills, a component unit of California State University, Dominguez Hills, for the year ended June 30, 2020, which comprises the organization's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Governmental Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the business-type activities of Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills as of June 30, 2020, and the changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis information, schedule of changes in net OPEB liability and related ratios, and schedule of plan contributions – GASB 75, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the 2020 financial statements that collectively comprise Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills basic financial statements. The 2020 schedule of net position, the schedule of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position, and other information as listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. This information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedules of Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills, referred to above, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

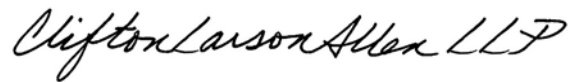
Report on Summarized Comparative Information

YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2020**

This section of Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills (ASI) annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the financial performance of ASI for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. This discussion has been prepared by management and should be read in conjunction with the financial statements and notes.

Introduction to Financial Statements

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements prepared in accordance with the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements No. 35, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for Public Colleges and Universities*. For reporting purposes, the University is considered a special-purpose government engaged only in business-type activities, which best represent the activities of ASI.

The financial statements include the statement of net position; the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position; and the statement of cash flows. These statements are supported by the notes to the financial statements and this section. All sections must be considered together to obtain a complete understanding of the financial picture of ASI.

Statement of Net Position - The statement of net position includes all assets and liabilities. Assets and liabilities are reported at their book value, on an accrual basis, as of the statement date. It also identifies major categories of restrictions on the net position of ASI.

Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position - The statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position presents the revenues earned and expenses incurred during the year on an accrual basis.

Statement of Cash Flows - The statement of cash flows presents the inflows and outflows of cash for the year and is summarized by operating, noncapital financing, capital and related financing, and investing activities. The statement is prepared using the direct method of cash flows and, therefore, presents gross rather than net amounts for the year's activities.

Reporting Entity - ASI is a nonprofit auxiliary organization of California State University, Dominguez Hills (the University). ASI sponsors various campus activities that complement the instructional programs of the University campus.

Summary

ASI operates under an Operating Agreement (the Agreement) with the Board of Trustees of the California State University System (Trustees) that expired on June 30, 2020. The ASI offices are housed in the Donald P. & Katherine B. Loker University Student Union (a separate auxiliary) at California State University, Dominguez Hills.

ASI is funded primarily through the receipt of mandatory student fees (identified as Student Activity Fee (SAF) in the University Fee Schedule) established through referenda by a vote of the students and collected by the University at the time of registration, which vary on a per student basis by academic term as follows:

Fall semester	\$ 70.00
Spring semester	\$ 65.00
Summer session	\$ 3.00

Portions of the SAF revenues have been designated by various student referenda and presidential consultations for support of specific student services programs including The ASI Children's Center, Toro Learning and Testing Center, Intercollegiate Athletics, and the Multicultural Affairs. The remainder of such revenues is treated as general funds, which have no restrictions and is used for operating expenses. The most recent Presidential Alternative Consultation sees the following notable changes as of July 1, 2018:

Child Development Center – The Child Development Center at California State University Dominguez Hills was founded in 1973 to provide affordable and quality childcare and developmental services for children of CSUDH students, faculty, and staff. The center's budget is now part of the ASI operating budget, with a current flat allocation of \$120,000 per academic year starting July 1, 2020 with additional revenues from parent fees, state contracts, and federal grant.

Toro Learning and Testing Center (TLTC) – Formerly Center for Learning and Academic Support Services, the TLTC was established in the ASI fee in 1982. ASI has provided continued support to this department for the academic success of all CSUDH students. As a result of the 2018 presidential consultation, ASI has started a 5-year divestment from the TLTC which is scheduled to receive its last ASI funds in the academic year 2021-2022 at \$2/student annually. Its ending balance at the end of the fiscal year reverts back to the ASI general funds.

Intercollegiate Athletics (ICA) – The support for the athletic program was established in the ASI fee in 1990. ICA maintains its annual support from ASI at \$29/student and keeps its ending balance at the end of the year.

Technology Referendum Fee (TRF) – The Technology Referendum Fee was established through a student referendum vote in Fall 1997. A total of \$5.50 per student each Fall and Spring Semester, the TRF revenue is designated for support of providing technology throughout the campus to improve technological skills of California State University, Dominguez Hills students. The Technology Referendum Fee has ended as of July 1, 2018, with its fee and ending balance reverting back to the ASI general funds.

Summary (Continued)

Multicultural Affairs (MCA) – Formerly Multicultural Center-MCC, the MCA was established in the ASI fee in 2001. Previously allocated at \$10/student annually, the MCA allocation has been set at \$100,000 annually for programming support as a result of the 2018 presidential consultation. The MCA shares this allocation with the following affinity centers: the Rose Black Resource Center, the Toro Dreamers Success Center and the Queer Culture Resource Center. Its ending balance at the end of the fiscal year reverts back to the ASI general funds.

Analytical Overview

Overview of Changes that Affected ASI during 2019-20

During the 2019-20 fiscal year, ASI continued to monitor its operational assets, revenues and expenditures. ASI is now be responsible for the tracking and accounting of assets as the University no longer provide assets management. The ASI accounting software continues to provide checks and balances in relation to University Accounting which has helped provide better reconciliation and reporting capabilities. The organization is working on updating and improving the software in order to have access to more accounting tools. In order to have a better understanding of the CDC finances, the accounting and finance managers are now helping with the Child Development Center's finances in various capacities, allowing the director to better focus on the center and the NAEYC accreditation. While enrollment at the center has decreased this year, the staff have chosen to focus on the teachers' training to further reach our accreditation goals. The actuarial study completed last year guided the Board of Directors' decision to continue funding our post-employment benefits trust (VEBA) and prepare a funding policy to actively recognize and decrease ASI's post-employment benefits liabilities. The financial policies and procedures manual were updated and approved. Significant changes have been discussed this year and will be implemented in the upcoming fiscal year in regards to the view point neutrality memorandum issued by the CSU Chancellor's Office to ensure that the funding process and decision-making for all funding requests are neutral and unbiased from all point of views. Organizational spending continues to focus on the strengthening of existing programs and services as well as offering new programs and services to students that best meet their needs in the new virtual college environment.

In full compliance with Section 89301 of the California Education Code, ASI utilizes California State University, Dominguez Hills as its accounting service provider. Independently funded student club accounts continue to be accounted for by the California State University, Dominguez Hills Foundation.

For the year ended June 30, 2020 net assets increased by \$170,491. This increase was bolstered by a noticeable surge in enrollment during the Fall and Spring semesters with respectively 16 percent and 11 percent increase from the projected headcount numbers. The new post-employment benefits valuation as per the GASB 75 requirement show an increase in noncurrent liabilities of \$ 389,422. This increase is largely due to an increase in staff members with the addition of a retiree and the absence of a funding policy for the ASI VEBA Trust. ASI is preparing a new funding policy for consistent funding towards its OPEB obligation through the VEBA Trust in the current year. Operating revenues from grants and contracts for the ASI Child Development Center have decreased this year due to low enrollment and the COVID-19 pandemic.

The current ASI programs and services offered are consistent with the mission, vision, and purpose of the corporation. Through the COVID-19 pandemic, ASI has maintained its commitment to providing programming albeit in a virtual format since March 2020. This reflects the organization's dedication to enhancing student life and adapting itself to provide services and programs to students even during a worldwide crisis such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

Factors Impacting Future Periods

ASI monitors enrollment numbers very closely to determine potential changes in the annual budgeted revenue. The university continues to show increases in headcount and FTES, although we observed a significant drop in enrollment between the Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 semester. The enrollment forecasting uncertainties coupled with the current pandemic crisis has led ASI to adopt a conservative approach with its headcount projections. Annual budgeted revenue has remained the same as headcount projections remain the same. ASI will focus spending on our constituents needs particularly during this virtual climate to ensure we provide the services that will enhance student life, fund student growth initiatives, and allow for stronger advocacy efforts.

ASI continues to support campus programming through partnerships with campus entities or clubs and organizations. Due to the recent development with the COVID-19 pandemic and the university's shift to online instruction, ASI is working hard to reimagine its signature programs and large-scale events to maintain and enhance pride and school spirit. ASI continues to focus on its marketing and brand to spread awareness of the programs and services offered to its constituents. As the ASI student internship program expands students will find added value in the organization. The Child Development Center (the Center) continues to monitor the Federal and State program changes that will have some significant impact in the delivery of services to assist students attending college with childcare. However, the corona virus pandemic and mandatory virtual instruction for the upcoming Fall 2020 and Spring 2021 semesters bring a lot of uncertainty too the future of the center. ASI will be monitoring this situation closely and make crucial decisions regarding the center's future throughout the mandatory campus closure. There have been several campus discussions around a merger between the Foundation Infant Toddler Center and the ASI Child Development Center.

Management will continue to review and monitor administrative operations and operating costs of both ASI and the Child Development Center and make adjustments accordingly. In addition, ASI has set up an evaluation process to monitor programs, services and activities provided to the campus community and recently conducted a survey has identified both existing expansion of services needed as well as possible new services. ASI completed work on a fee reallocation campaign, but the referendum did not pass when proposed to the students. ASI will consider further presidential consultations to continue its strategic divestment goals from annual allocations to University departments. Monies previously allocated to these entities will become a part of the ASI General Fund. This will help ASI fund programs and services that meet the needs of constituents, fund more initiatives created by students, as well as increase the monies available for investments. ASI is striving to create new sources of revenues through various projects including the pursuit of a Consumer Price Index that will be affixed to the annual ASI fee. The approval of the index could only come from two sources: a presidential consultation or a referendum vote with the student population.

Relative to Chancellor's Office Executive Order 1000 (EO 1000), the formula developed by the CFO to recover university costs continue to increase ASI's reimbursement, and we anticipate that it will continue to increase in the current fiscal year. It has been a challenge throughout the year to obtain the formula and cost estimate that would allow ASI to precisely budget for the expense. We look forward to working with the Administration and Finance Division to develop memorandum of understandings regarding the services provided and the reimbursement due for each state department/division that provides services to ASI.

Factors Impacting Future Periods (Continued)

It has been a challenging year due to the recent worldwide health crisis, but ASI continues to maintain its operations and activities mostly virtually. Staff have adapted well to the challenges and continue to keep both organizations operating at optimal performance within the boundaries of the virtual environment available to us. Students across several California State campuses have joined efforts in demanding refunds of their student fees as they alleged inaccessibility of the student services funded by these fees following the mandatory stay-at-home order by California Governor Gavin Newsom's back in March 2020 and the move to virtual instruction for the CSU system. Consequently, class action lawsuits were filed against both the California State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) systems. ASI will closely monitor the class action lawsuit against the CSU system – commonly referred to as the Miller case – and will cautiously prepare itself to meet the decisions of the lawsuit. We will also monitor the class action lawsuit against the UC system – commonly referred to as the Brandmeyer case – as it may impact the CSU system.

NOTE 1 ORGANIZATION

Nature of Organization

Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills (ASI), is a nonprofit auxiliary organization of California State University, Dominguez Hills (the University). ASI sponsors various campus activities that complement the instructional programs of the University campus.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying basic financial statements have been prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements have been met.

Financial Reporting Entity

The financial statements include the accounts of ASI. ASI is a government organization under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and is also a component unit of the University, a public university under the California State University system. ASI has chosen to use the reporting model for special-purpose governments engage only in business type activities.

Basis of Accounting and Reporting

ASI records revenue in part from registration fees and other charges for services to external users and, accordingly, has chosen to present its basic financial statements using the reporting model for special-purpose governments engaged only in business-type activities. This model allows all financial information for ASI to be reported in a single column in the basic financial statements. The effect of internal activity between funds or groups of funds has been eliminated from these basic financial statements.

Classification of Current and Noncurrent Assets and Liabilities

ASI considers assets to be current that can reasonably be expected, as part of its normal business operations, to be converted to cash and be available for liquidation of current liabilities within 12 months of the statement of net position date. Liabilities that reasonably can be expected, as part of normal ASI business operations, to be liquidated within 12 months of the statement of net position date are considered to be current. All other assets and liabilities are considered to be noncurrent.

Deferred Outflows and Deferred Inflows

Deferred outflows and deferred inflows of resources related to postemployment benefit plan are certain changes in total liabilities and fiduciary net position that are to be recognized in future postemployment benefit plan expense.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

ASI considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity date of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The deposits of ASI are maintained at financial institutions and are fully insured or collateralized. The carrying amount of the ASI's deposits represents the bank balance adjusted for outstanding checks and deposits in transit.

The ASI, through the University, maintains its cash balance at one financial institution and is exposed to credit risk for amounts exceeding federally insured limits (\$250,000) in the event of nonperformance by the financial institution. The University has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk for cash and cash equivalents. There is no cash balance exceeding the federally insured limits at June 30, 2020.

Short-Term Investments

Investments are reflected at fair value using quoted market prices. Gains and losses are included in the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position as investment income.

Accounts Receivables, Net

Accounts receivables are primarily unsecured amounts due from grantors on cost reimbursement or performance grants, student fees, and parent fees. Receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for an adjustment to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that remain outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are stated at cost or estimated historical cost if purchased, or if donated are at acquisition value. Capital assets with a value of less than \$5,000 are not capitalized. ASI is required to capitalize infrastructure assets that have been acquired, or that have received major improvements, in fiscal years ending after June 30, 1980. Title to all assets is held by ASI. Depreciation is determined using the straight-line method over the estimated lives of the assets ranging from five to ten years. Leasehold improvements are amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the term of the lease. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend its life are not capitalized.

Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue consists primarily of fees collected in advance for summer school and fall semester.

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NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Accrued Compensated Absences

Accrued compensated absences are accrued on a monthly basis based on length of service and job classification. Full-time employees accrue vacation time based upon job classification and years of service to ASI as follows:

Accrued leave will be paid at the time of termination.

Classification of Revenues and Expenses

ASI considers operating revenues and expenses in the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position to be the revenues and expenses that result from exchange transactions or from other activities that are connected directly to the ASI's primary functions. Exchange transactions include charges for services rendered and the acquisition of goods and services. Certain other transactions are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses in accordance with GASB Statement No. 33. These nonoperating activities consist of net investment income and the disposition of research equipment.

Government Revenue

Government revenue is recognized when the qualifying costs are incurred for cost-reimbursement grants or contracts or when a unit of service is provided for performance grants. Government revenue from federal agencies is subject to independent audit required by the Uniform Guidance and review by grantor agencies. The review could result in the disallowance of expenditures under the terms of the grant or reductions of future grant funds. Based on prior experience, ASI's management believes that costs ultimately disallowed, if any, would not materially affect the net position of ASI.

Income Taxes

ASI is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and California income taxes under section 23701(d) of the California Revenue and Taxation Code. The IRS classified the organization as one that is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is an organization described in section(s) 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

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NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

ASI has evaluated its tax positions and the certainty as to whether those tax positions will be sustained in the event of an audit by taxing authorities at the federal and state levels. The primary tax positions evaluated are related to ASI's continued qualification as a tax-exempt organization and whether there is unrelated business income activities conducted that would be taxable. Management has determined that all income tax positions will more likely than not be sustained upon potential audit or examination; therefore, no disclosures of uncertain income tax positions are required.

Estimates

The preparation of these financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses, as well as the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Management also determines the accounting principles to be used in the preparation of the financial statements. A description of the significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements follows.

Comparative Totals

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with ASI's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2019 from which the summarized information was derived.

Fair Value Measurements

ASI reports its fair value measures using a three-level hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value in accordance with GASB 72, *Fair Value Measurement and Application*. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction in the principal or most advantageous market at the measurement date under current market conditions regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. Inputs used to determine fair value refer broadly to the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability including assumptions about risk. Inputs may be observable or unobservable. Observable inputs are inputs that reflect the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity. Unobservable inputs are inputs that reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on the best information available. GASB 72 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy, established by GAAP, requires that entities maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value.

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NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets to which ASI has access at the measurement date.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. Level 2 inputs include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active;
- observable inputs other than quoted prices for the asset or liability (for example, interest rates and yield curves); and
- inputs derived principally from, or corroborated by, observable market data by correlation or by other means.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. Unobservable inputs should be used to measure the fair value to the extent that observable inputs are not available.

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable and related party receivables approximate fair value because of the terms and relatively short maturity of these financial instruments. The investments are valued at quoted market prices, which represent the net asset value held by ASI at year-end.

The carrying amounts of liabilities, approximate fair value because of the relatively short maturity of these financial instruments.

When available, ASI measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) has recently affected global markets, supply chains, employees of companies and our communities. Management of the organization is taking appropriate actions to mitigate the impact. However, the full impact of COVID-19 is unknown and cannot be reasonably estimated as of June 30, 2020.

NOTE 3 INVESTMENTS

ASI has pooled investments with the CSU Systemwide Investment Fund Trust (SWIFT). As a result of a 2007 change in Education Code 89721(l) that allowed CSU to self-manage student tuition and fees, CSU created a central banking system and created the SWIFT investment portfolio for the purpose of enhancing centralized cash and investment management. Because the central banking system and SWIFT are inextricably linked, each member in the central banking system is also a member in SWIFT, also referred to collectively as The Bank of CSU. These funds are reported as a short-term investment. The SWIFT consists of investments of cash on an overnight and/or short-term basis, the funds.

representing the float on funds collected from all eligible sources prior to their use for payment of accounts payable and payroll. Excess cash over and above what is needed to fund short-term payables and payroll are transferred to medium or longer term investments.

ASI relies upon information provided by the SWIFT in estimating the fair value position of its holdings in it. ASI's holdings in SWIFT had a value of \$2,549,936 as of June 30, 2020

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NOTE 6 PENSION PLAN

ASI provides a variable annuity plan (the Plan) which covers ASI's management and other qualifying participants after the first year of employment. The Plan is a defined contribution plan which provides for an employer contribution in an amount determined from year to year at the employer's discretion to individual accounts of qualifying participants. Matching contributions were \$27,479 for the year ended June 30, 2020. The Plan is administered by various carriers including Metlife, Vanguard and TIAA-CREF.

NOTE 7 POSTEMPLOYMENT HEALTHCARE BENEFITS

Plan Description

ASI sponsors a single-employer defined benefit postretirement health care plan to pay a portion of the retiree's insurance premiums. ASI participates in the Auxiliaries Multiple Employer VEBA (Voluntary Employees Beneficiary Association). The auxiliaries Multiple Employer VEBA is a separate 501(c) 9 organization established in August 2010 to assist in funding post-retirement healthcare benefits for recognized auxiliaries of the California State University System. The Auxiliaries Multiple Employer VEBA issues separate audited financial statements. Plan Description

ASI provides retiree medical, dental and vision benefits to employees who retire from ASI at age 50 or later with at least 5 years of service. ASI pays the CalPERS monthly medical premiums for eligible retirees, subject to a cap, which increases each year. This benefit continues for the life of the retiree and then for the life of a surviving spouse, if any. Retirees may select any retiree medical plan offered by CalPERS, including spouse or family coverage, but must incur the cost of premiums exceeding the cap.

Total OPEB Liability, Fiduciary Net Position, and Net OPEB Liability

In accordance with the parameters of Government Accounting Standards Board Statement 75, *Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions* (GASB 75), the OPEB expense and deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB that are required to be reported by an employer primarily result from changes in the components of the net OPEB liability-that is, changes in the total OPEB liability and in the OPEB plan's fiduciary net position.

This statement requires that most changes in the net OPEB liability be included in OPEB expense in the period of the change. For example, changes in the total OPEB liability resulting from current-period service cost, interest on the total OPEB liability, and changes of benefit terms are required to be included in OPEB expense immediately. Projected earnings on the OPEB plan's investments also are required to be included in the determination of OPEB expense immediately.

In circumstances in which the net OPEB liability is determined based on the results of an actuarial valuation, the effects of certain other changes in the net OPEB liability are required to be included in OPEB expense over the current and future periods. The effects on the total

OPEB liability of (1) changes of economic and demographic assumptions or of other inputs and (2) differences between expected and actual experience are required to be included in OPEB expense in a systematic and rational manner over a closed period equal to the average of the expected remaining service lives of all employees that are provided with benefits through the OPEB plan (active employees and inactive employees), beginning in the current period.

Discount Rate

The discount rate is based on a blend of (a) the long-term expected rate of return on assets for benefits covered by plan assets and a yield or index for 20-year, tax-exempt general obligation municipal bonds with an average rating of AA/Aa or better for benefits not covered by plan assets.

Above are the arithmetic long-term expected real rates of return by asset class for the next 20+ years as provided by Morgan Stanley Wealth Management. The Strategic return is based on a seven-year time horizon while the Secular return is based on a 20-year-plus time horizon. Investment expenses were assumed to be 25 basis points per year. These returns were matched with cash flows for benefits covered by plan assets and the Bond Buyer 20- Bond General Obligation index was matched with cash flows not covered by plan assets to measure the reasonableness of the choice in discount rate.

Trust assets are invested and held in custody by Benefit Trust Company serving as the Corporate Trustee, in a mix that includes approximately 37.4% equity, 42.4% fixed income, 11.1% international equity, and 9.1% real estate. As of June 30, 2020, the market value of ASI's VEBA account was \$145,469. As of July 1, 2018, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the actuarial accrued liability for benefits as well as the unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) was \$1,170,235.

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NOTE 8 TRANSACTIONS WITH RELATED ENTITIES

ASI leases certain facilities from the Donald P. and Katherine B. Loker University Student Union (Student Union) for a nominal amount. In lieu of rent, ASI administers various student programs. The ASI recognizes expenses related to student programs in student services expense. The current ASI lease expired on June 30, 2020.

The University bills ASI for financial administration and other costs including utilities, maintenance, postage, and other reimbursable expenses. For the year ended June 30, 2020, ASI paid \$743,041 to the University. ASI received \$837 from the University for services, space, and programs.

NOTE 9 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

ASI has evaluated events subsequent to June 30, 2020, to assess the need for potential recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. Such events were evaluated through September 14, 2020, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Events occurring after that date have not been evaluated to determine whether a change in the financial statements would be required. Based upon this evaluation, it was determined that no subsequent events occurred that require recognition or additional disclosure in the financial statements.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills' internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills' internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills' internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

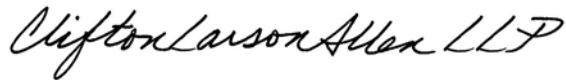
Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Associated Students, Inc. California State University, Dominguez Hills' financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
